Pastor's Corner by Pr Dave Heckler



This year, as we begin a new church year with the season of Advent, we find ourselves preparing for the beginning of another new era as well, a new presidency and political era in the United States. Given the tenor of the campaign that preceded it and the political dominance that resulted from it, many people will find their lives significantly changed by its results. Moreover, the life and witness of the Church in the American context faces a significant challenge in these years ahead (as if we weren't already doing so before the election). So I'd like to share some of my own thoughts on where we find ourselves:

- + In the eyes of our younger generations in particular, one thing this election has challenged (anew and more strikingly) is the integrity of the Church. However you feel about that reality, now more than ever, **the Church needs to be the Church—the Body of the outcast-loving, self-giving, despised, crucified, and risen Christ Jesus alive and embodied in the world.** Politicians of every stripe love to parade the banners of a caricature of Jesus and say in the words of Constantine's motto, "By this sign conquer"; but doing so cheapens the power of the Gospel by substituting a domesticated and Americanized "Brand Jesus" for the real Lord of the universe. But in this Advent/Christmas/Epiphany cycle, we're reminded that in the incarnation of God in Christ Jesus, the real God meets us not in the triumph of the "successful", but in the humility of the poor and downtrodden. As we proclaim this real God, we need to begin by meeting Him precisely there...
- + The incarnation of God in Christ also shows us **the radical way God chooses to save the world: from the bottom up.** The people of our communities and our nation face many struggles, and Biblically speaking, government and its leaders are called by God to help those people with their struggles; but given our current political milieu, if our neighbors in need are going to find relief, we (and especially we as the Church) won't have the luxury of waiting for the government to help them. Together, we'll need to meet our vulnerable neighbors where they are, get to know them and their stories (and not just our stereotypes of them), and help them "from below", from the grassroots. (And the Christmas surprise is that as we do so, that's precisely where we'll meet Jesus...)

This may sound counterintuitive, but if you need a natural illustration of the radical way God chooses to transform the world through Christ alive in us, think of a **virus**. Viruses don't look like much in the scheme of things; but if COVID-19 was any indication, they're as powerful as any nuclear warhead, even if they don't leave giant craters in their wake. Viruses take over your body by invading a cell and reprogramming it to produce more viruses, which then take over more cells, etc. Jesus reigns in this world much as a virus does in your body. He doesn't need to have the position or the throne or the destructive power to reign in this world; He transforms people's hearts instead, making them more and more like Himself, living out His life-giving priorities at the grassroots level. And transformed people transform people...

- + And precisely because we're the Body of the outcast-loving, self-giving, despised, crucified, and risen Christ Jesus alive and embodied in the world, we as the Church need more than ever to decide which side of the courtroom we're going to serve from. Many Christians find it far easier to accuse and demonize all those "other" people, pounding them with condemnation from the Scriptures and urging society to do the same. The irony is that in so doing, they embody the courtroom role of the accuser and prosecutor, one which Biblically bears the Aramaic title of "Satan". But in the Gospel of John, Jesus tells us that the Holy Spirit who births the Church fulfills the courtroom role of the "Paraclete"— the one who stands with the accused, who takes the stand on their behalf and testifies to their humanity in the image of God and its overcoming value in God's sight. (And in Hebrews, Jesus Himself is cast as the Paraclete...) I believe that now more than ever, the Church needs to be **the Community of the Paraclete** and take our stand with those whom the rest of society will love to scapegoat and reject, not only to claim "solidarity" with them, but to actually embrace them in God's grace and love and call them our brothers and sisters. (And yes, I believe that to do the opposite is ultimately to stand over against Jesus, not with Him...)
- + Needless to say, as we the Church actually do this, it's going to make us even more a community of **"resident aliens"**, a community that stands in distinct contrast to the scapegoating and violence that makes politics easy but actual caring terribly difficult. We'll look (and perhaps feel) like oddballs in our communities, and certainly in comparison to more "successful" churches that go with the cultural flow and/or stick to getting people to heaven rather than worrying about helping them on earth. But if one of my favorite Biblical passages (Hebrews 11:8-16) is correct, this is precisely who we're called to be— resident aliens who live in tents with a radical

trust in anticipation of God's promised future. And if we're true to this calling, we'll also be distinctive as **a community of grace and love** that embraces all people as God's beloved children...

Our younger generations are longing to see the Church actually live this calling; the outcasts of our society are literally dying for us to do so. And should we be bold enough to do so, should we bold enough to live in and embody the Christ of Bethlehem and Calvary and Easter even in a spiritually violent age, the song so many of us sang in our youth may yet prove true: "They'll know we are Christians by our love"...

If you have a tabletop Advent wreath at home, we encourage you to break it out and feature it on your "home altar" along with the bread and wine if you join with us online for worship.


Special Advent Services:

AHUB Upper Bucks Code Blue News

The **Upper Bucks Code Blue** sheltering ministry of Advocates for the Homeless of Upper Bucks (AHUB) provides emergency shelter for homeless people when nighttime temperatures and/or wind chills reach dangerous levels— in our case, 26 degrees or below— from **Nov. 15 through Apr. 15**. Last winter, we provided such shelter for 55 different guests over 65 nights; and we anticipate that this winter, we'll be sheltering even more of our neighbors in need at the Masonic Lodge building in downtown Quakertown. But this ministry requires volunteers sharing their time, organizational skills, relational skills, and of course, food and supplies to make this shelter available for folks in need. **We especially need people willing to serve in overnight shifts** (either 8:15 PM-2:00 AM or 2:00-7:00 AM).
